Celebrating the Arts

This year, Chisholm Trail Arts Council, Duncan Little Theater and Chisholm Trail Heritage Center teamed up to take "Arts" to the State Capitol on May 5. While there, they visited with legislators, about the importance of arts education in communities.

Did you know arts organizations in Stephens County educate over 10,000 students each year? Often non-profit classes are the only arts training students will receive.

1. Chisholm Trail Heritage Center uses STEAM in all of its educational programs. STEAM = Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics
2. Arts grants brought \$59,995 in state taxes back to Stephens County in 2014
3. Arts education in schools increases test scores across every subject area, lowers drop out rates and helps close the achievement gap regardless of socio-economic status
4. In a well-documented national study using a federal database of over 25,000 middle and high school students, researchers from the University of California at Los Angeles found students with high arts involvement performed better on standardized achievement tests than students with low arts involvement.

Blue Stem Ridge efforts visible

Trees have been cleared off the Blue Stem Ridge that is north of the facility, near Chisholm Trail Parkway.

A new entrance/exit post has been added to the south end of the trail, created by Ethan Lang for his Eagle Scout rank. The new post matches the first one at the north end of the nature trail.
