Weaving their life stories

Ancient handwoven techniques, looms, artifacts, history, culture and family are the tools by which textile artists, Tyra Shackelford and Margaret Roach Wheeler produce award-winning art. While many women may spend their entire lives researching their family history, hoping to discover who they are, both Tyra and Margaret know the answers to their life and what inspires them.

Every piece they produce tells a story -- their story. They will share those stories in their own words and through their art, when their show, "Textiles Transcending" opens in April. Reception is 2-4pm Sunday, April 8.

One of Tyra's new pieces (seen at right) is "Twin Turkeys." She was inspired and created her own pattern, based off two pieces of art, an Eagle design, and a Mississippian shell gorget that had a southeastern design.

One of Margaret's pieces includes poles that are near 7-feet tall, with cloth featuring images of her mother (at age 93) herself and her granddaughter (at age 3) and includes Irish lace, a Mexican brass lantern and other found objects. It is a tribute to the women in her family. Both artists were raised in different eras and with different mindsets, but, as Chickasaw artists, each are deeply committed to their cultural history. Margaret was surprised earlier this month with the Oklahoma Governor Arts Award for her work. 


We continue our Featured Artist spotlight in the Garis Gallery of the American West with Douglas Dillon.


He is a self-taught artist and enjoys entering the Texas State Fair and he consistently brings home the ribbons.

They're off to grab their piece of Oklahoma land! March 26 to May 25, thousands of students will descend on the Heritage Center for the educational field trip sessions centered around Oklahoma's historic land give-aways.

Kentucky Daisey (As interpreted by Edie Smith Stewart) returns this year to share her story of participating in the land lottery. She was a news reporter from Texas who came to Oklahoma to stake her claim. Her story can be found in the book, "Buckskin, Calico and Lace" by Oklahoma author, Glenda Carlile. Our popular program of the year gives students an interactive educational experience as they learn about the modes of transportation used in the land giveaways; how Buffalo Soldiers came by their name and other lessons. Just an example of the many letters we receive from school teachers who bring their classes to the Heritage Center.

>As a third grade teacher, we have the opportunity of teaching the Oklahoma History Curriculum. However, many 8- and 9-year-olds lack the background knowledge to understand much of the terminology and historical relevance in that subject area.

By allowing them to see and experience museums that showcase historical events in Oklahoma, [and] hands-on and visual approaches that let them see history brought to life, they are able to make connections that were otherwise difficult or impossible.

Chisholm Trail [Heritage Center] offers so many realistic exhibits that puts the students "in history" so they are able to experience events we have talked about, but they weren't fully able to understand. Often times, providing these experiences to our students is not at all possible without funding.

Many students come from very fixed or low-income homes and cannot afford to pay for museum admission, and transportation costs. We all know that schools are not equipped with the funding for these activities.

I have [in the past, had] to fundraise to provide money for my students to experience museums, and even that doesn't guarantee the amount of money

needed to fund a field trip, not to mention it takes a lot of time, effort and planning on the teacher's part. As a teacher, [and] single parent on a fixed income, I greatly appreciate the Chisholm Trail museum's willingness and effort to provide students in our community with experiences, that will solidify their learning and memories that will last forever.
